In fact, across Christmas 2022, St Vincent's experienced a 21% spike in admissions to the ED. A true appreciation of the wonders of **engineering and medicine**

"It's because of medical research and technology that people can live longer and spend precious time with their families."

What if you could help save lives through the combined wonders of engineering and medicine?

That's what inspired Philip Spry-Bailey, former Board Chairman of St Vincent's Hospital, to support the ACMD. He listed two reasons for supporting this new collaborative research centre.

First is his own interest as a graduate of engineering.

Second, he's had the good fortune to personally benefit from the wonders of two ground-breaking medical devices.

"It's thanks to St Vincent's and its doctors that I'm alive today. I'm a recipient of several remarkable devices, a pacemaker, and an artificial sphincter.

Devices that combine both engineering and medical science."

A recent generous gift from The Patricia Spry-Bailey Charitable Foundation went towards constructing a Faraday Room within the ACMD. A Faraday Room is a special room used to conduct experiments to develop hearing and vision devices. It's fitted with a shield to block electromagnetic fields and any electrical, sound, or light interference.

"My grandfather died at the age of 60 from heart failure. He probably would have lived a lot longer had he been fitted with a pacemaker. I'm now in my 90s. It's because of medical research and technology that people can live longer, spend precious time with their families and enjoy living," Philip said. Philip Spry-Bailey's relationship with St Vincent's Hospital spans over 30 years.

It began in 1989 when he was invited by St Vincent's Hospital founders, the Sisters of Charity, to join the finance committee of St Vincent's Hospital Melbourne. At the time he was Chief Financial Officer of Alcoa Australia.

Philip then became the Chairman of the first St Vincent's Hospital Melbourne Board and later the Chairman of the national board, a role he held for seven years.

Thanks to your inspired support, significant progress is being made on the build of the new home of the ACMD.

A huge crane is a new addition on the ACMD building site. It's anticipated to perform around 10,000 lifts of materials and equipment.

ACMD Project Director Andrew Crettenden said, "The next major milestone will be the 'Topping Out Ceremony', a time-honoured tradition to signify the successful completion of the structural phase of a project. The ceremony is forecast to happen in May."

The 11-storey biomedical engineering research centre is scheduled to be completed in 2024 and planned to be operating in early 2025.

2024 will be a huge year for the project. Each floor will be fitted out, the old and new building will be integrated and by the end of the year we expect to start moving patients into the Tower.

Cameron Smith, Capital Campaign Director said, "The overwhelming interest and support we've already received for this project is very inspiring. We wish to recognise and thank our visionary donor families who have committed to the project."



One family has secured the naming of the ground floor of the building. Two nursing stations, six patient rooms, a maternity room and two oncology pods have also been named by generous families.

"I'm delighted to announce that we have an exciting range of spaces available to name within the building. There are luxurious maternity suites, the Special Care Nursery where our teams do some incredible work with some of our tiniest patients, and stunning garden areas, to name a few," Cameron said.

A loving tribute that **inspired giving**

When the love of your life gets cancer, you want him surrounded by caring doctors and nurses.

That's why Elaine Arrigo was so grateful to the staff at St Vincent's. Because of the wonderful care they provided to her husband, Nino, when he was diagnosed with blood cancer.

Nino spent five years undergoing treatment at St Vincent's Hospital in Fitzroy for Mantel Cell Lymphoma, an unusual blood cancer. Elaine said the staff who cared for her husband were amazing.

Nino fought hard but he succumbed to the aggressive blood cancer in November 2016.

In 2022, Elaine made a substantial donation to St Vincent's Werribee which was completed after Nino passed. "I decided to support the hospital because we have always received great care at St Vincent's. It's the people that make it special. I know Nino would have wanted me to support St Vincent's in our local community."

Elaine still grieves for Nino today. The pair were destined to be together. They were both born in Werribee and practically grew up together. When Elaine turned 17, Nino asked her out on a date, they quickly bonded and were married for 43 beautiful years.

Breakthrough program to tackle **First Nations youth mental health crisis**... thanks to a **generous grant**

Nobody should have to deal with mental health problems on their own. Some of the worst affected young people in our community are First Nations youth. That's why The William Buckland Foundation chose to support the establishment of a First Nations Mental Health Wellbeing Pilot Program at St Vincent's Hospital Melbourne.

In 2022, over 130 First Nations youth visited the St Vincent's Emergency Department (ED) because they were suffering a mental health crisis.

The Program, which is the first of its kind in Australia, will create a position for a First Nations Mental Health Nurse to address this crisis by assisting youth presenting at ED. This will have a great impact in our community.

Project Lead and Manager of the Aboriginal Hospital Liaison Service, Nicole Watt said, "This pilot program was designed in collaboration with the Victorian Aboriginal Health Service who were pivotal in the consultation and support of this role.

"We are so thankful to be given the opportunity to complete our vision to improve the lives of First Nations youth. It wouldn't have been possible without the incredibly generous support we've received from The William Buckland Foundation."

The pilot project will operate for two years. The First Nations Mental Health Nurse will support First Nations youth in mental health crisis. They will empower the patient to identify their care goals, bridge gaps to involve their family and community and make referrals to counselling and other services such as housing and job placement, if needed.

Former St Vincent's Foundation CEO, Sue Parkes said, **"We are so grateful to The William Buckland** Foundation for their visionary support. Thanks to this very generous grant, St Vincent's will be able to pave the way towards a viable solution to improving the lives and futures of First Nations youth in our community."

Fighting Blood Cancer at St Vincent's – finding a cure together with enduring legacies

Imagine being told you have an incurable cancer.

St Vincent's patient, Kath Rutherford received this devastating news in 2020. Thankfully, although her blood cancer called Light Chain Multiple Myeloma is incurable, it is treatable.

"My instant reaction to the diagnosis was disbelief. I said to myself, they've got the wrong person this can't be happening to me!" Kath said.

Shortly after her diagnosis, Kath was referred to Director of Clinical Hematology Service and Clinical Hematology Research at St Vincent's, Oncologist and Professor Hang Quach. Luckily, she determined that Kath was an excellent candidate for a lifechanging clinical trial. Professor Quach and her team are quite literally leading the way in cancer clinical trials for patients with blood cancers – notably leukaemia, lymphoma, and multiple myeloma, by providing patients with access to cutting-edge therapies. Patients are not only living longer, but they're also enjoying an excellent quality of life.

Despite the amazing work the team are doing with clinical trial patients, there is still a big gap in funding.

It's thanks to people like you that the gap is starting to close. It's your kind support that makes the difference to the more than 750 new patients who are referred to St Vincent's Oncology team every year.
