AIKENHEAD CENTRE FOR MEDICAL DISCOVERY (ACMD) WORLD FIRST EPILEPSY IMPLANT

A world first ACMD research project is changing the way we record and potentially treat epilepsy. Chair of Medicine at St Vincent's Hospital, Professor Mark Cook and his team have implanted a radical device that records the electrical activity of both sides of the brain to monitor epileptic seizures.

The first two patients on the trial received the Epi-Minder implant in November and will wear the device for six months. During this period they will undergo intensive monitoring at the hospital over two separate week-long stays.

Research Fellow, Dr Alan Lai explained that many people who have seizures struggle to accurately record their frequency because they are often unaware they have had an episode.

"During the patient's stay we collect all three sets of data: the implant, in patient monitoring and a seizure diary. This comprehensive data will better inform how we treat seizures because we'll have the 'whole picture'," Alan said.

Cathryn McNaught was really keen to be a part of the trial because none of the drugs she has tried over the last 15 years have been successful at controlling her 'phasing out' seizures.

"Epilepsy has placed restrictions on my life. I was boiling water recently, I had a seizure and burnt my

hand and foot very badly. It's frustrating that I can't even do simple tasks without putting myself at risk.

"I'm so excited to be a part of this trial. Having an accurate record of my seizures means I may be able to take part in other trials, giving me the best chance to stop my seizures," Cathryn said.

Rob Bechaz has experienced massive grand mal seizures since he was 18. He saw many different doctors who were unable to control his condition. Then he met Professor Cook 16 years ago, who has been able to provide Rob with exceptional care.

In 2015, Rob had brain resection surgery at St Vincent's Private Hospital. Unfortunately, only 95% of the matter could be removed so Rob still has 'phasing out' seizures.

"This device will help me to understand what my body is doing but most importantly, it will help other people. It's also my way of giving back to Prof Cook who has never given up!"

The ultimate goal is for the implant to eventually become a clinical device to help identify far more accurate treatment methods for people with epilepsy.

This trial was supported by the Victorian Government's Victorian Medical Research Acceleration Fund.

Nationally, staff across the organisation have been incredibly generous with their financial support. We are proud of and grateful for the contribution our staff have been able to make to the relief effort both 'on the ground' and financially.

Patients sit in comfort thanks to Dry July

Dry July is a fundraiser that encourages participants to go alcohol-free in July to raise funds for people affected by cancer.

Funds go towards helping to provide invaluable services for cancer patients, their families and carers. Thank you to all the participants of the 2019 Dry July campaign who raised over \$40,000. This fantastic result has enabled us to purchase four new treatment chairs for the Cancer Centre.

One patient who has benefitted is Athol Atkins. Three years ago Athol started to feel unwell. A blood test showed his kidneys were functioning at just 10%. Athol was rushed to Warrnambool Hospital where he was diagnosed with multiple myeloma cancer.

After six months of chemotherapy, Athol was accepted into a placebo-based worldwide trial through St Vincent's Hospital Melbourne, which proved to be very effective. After 14 months, Athol had to be placed onto a new treatment, shortly followed by being included on a new trial.

This new treatment was so successful that Athol and his wife Sue received the best possible news they could have hoped for. As of October 2019, he was told he was in remission.



Athol is now feeling fantastic. He and Sue still come to St Vincent's Cancer Centre once a month for what he calls a "grease and oil change to keep it asleep."

It's during these visits that he spends five hours at a time sitting in one of the new chairs in the Cancer Centre. Athol said, "the chair is extremely comfortable, easy to operate and particularly good for a nap."

After learning of his diagnosis, Athol's son James took part in Dry July to support his dad. Two years later he's still alcohol free!
